

The Guard VA Benefits Act (H.R. 1139) protects veterans from unaccredited lawyers and other agents who charge money to help veterans draw their benefits.


As of 3/17/2023, it is still in the House Committee on Veterans



Affairs, so if your Department has representatives on the committee, encourage them to vote yes. The bill has 74 co-sponsors. Use this link to see if your congressperson is among them. Mike Bost (R-III.-12) is chairman of the HCVA and he has yet to co-sponsor the bill. When he does, more will follow because he is very influential. I hope those of you in Illinois contact him. Also, Kevin Hern (R-Okla.-1) added his name to the bill but removed it six days later. If Oklahoma wants to ask him about his change of heart, let me know his answer because I am curious.
