Illustrating America Contest

Currently, we have just a little over two months to follow up with those who we have handed out the **Illustrating America Art Contest** information and applications. It is very important to make sure they are reminded of the deadline to submit entries to your Auxiliary is **March 31, 2026**. **If you plan on doing a District Judging for all the entries for your District, please set up the date and judges now.** They must be sent to me by **April 15, 2026**. I need time to have them judged and sent to National Headquarters by **May 5, 2026**. Double check to make sure it is the newly updated application that they are using along with the child's name, age, and grade level must be written on the back of the artwork. Please make sure you are reading and following the size of the canvas or the art paper. There are size dimensions listed in the rules. Also, when shipping, if you roll it up and put it in a tube it makes it difficult to get it to flatten out without damaging the art/picture. If you are having problems getting into the schools, think outside the box. Check with local art museums, the libraries, church groups, scouting groups, friends, and family.

Upcoming Dates and Deadlines


- **March 31:** Student entries are due to participating/sponsoring VFW Auxiliary for judging.

- **April 15:** First-place winner from each participating/sponsoring VFW Auxiliary or optional VFW Auxiliary District judging due to the VFW Auxiliary Department for judging.

Youth Acts of Kindness



ILLUSTRATING AMERICA

ILLUSTRATING AMERICA COMES FULL CIRCLE: FORMER WINNER, NOW TEACHER, SHARES CONTEST WITH CLASS



In 2016-2017, Auxiliary 1523 in Putnam, Connecticut held the first-ever Illustrating America contest. It was created to encourage artists in grades K-8 to show their view of America while also promoting the Young American Creative Patriotic Art Contest, which students

would be able to enter upon reaching high school. Illustrating America would go on to be a Department of Connecticut contest and, as of 2019-2020, a National contest, which it has remained since.

That first year, there were more than 100 student entries between Putnam Elementary and Putnam Middle schools. The first-place winner for grades 6-8 was Mackenzie Peloquin, an eighth grader whose watercolor painting of silhouetted people against a twilight sky depicted an America of peaceful protest. In her own words: "The intention of my piece was to spread a message of peace and unity in America." Mackenzie went on to graduate both middle and high school as salutatorian (her identical twin sister, Brooke, was valedictorian) and to study elementary education at Endicott College in Massachusetts.

Now she is back at Putnam Elementary School – this time, as a fourth grade teacher. And she is preparing her

own students to enter the Illustrating America contest. In October, Peloquin sat for an interview in her brightly-decorated classroom during the tail end of Spirit Week, ahead of Halloween, during which she talked about her childhood experience with the contest, her first year commanding her own classroom and those who have inspired her along the way.

"My third grade teacher was Ms. Simanski; I actually went back and did an internship with her in college," says Peloquin. "She made her classroom very safe and welcoming, I made a lot of friends that year and she did a lot of hands-on, really engaging projects that made me excited about learning at the time."

Peloquin hopes to inspire her students the same way, giving them room to be creative while also stressing that perfection isn't required, including when working on their Illustrating America entries.

"I encourage them not to worry about making mistakes. If they're putting in an effort, it doesn't have to be perfect. It just has to be their best. Start and see what happens; you usually end up with something good by the end!"

In middle school, Peloquin dealt with insecurity in her after-school art club, as art was a challenge that did not come naturally to her. This made winning Illustrating America all the more exciting.

"I remember comparing myself to the other kids in art club and thinking my (work) was not as good as theirs. I would get frustrated and start over a million times. It was a good self-esteem boost to win the competition...I remember working really hard on it in art club!" When asked about her win for an E-Newsletter "Where Are They Now?" article in 2022, Peloquin noted, "Placing in the competition was one of the first times I had placed in any contest... I was so excited to tell my friends and family that I won because it felt good to be recognized for



the hard work I put into the project. Winning gave me a sense of confidence and made me feel like I can accomplish the things I set my mind to."

She hopes participating in Illustrating America this year will bring the same sense of accomplishment and confidence to her students, some of whom are dealing with difficult home lives or academic struggles, and many of whom came to her not reading at grade level. "I think it's important for students to be able to express themselves and have an outlet for all the many things that are going on in their lives in a healthy way," Peloquin explains. "Just to have something they can take ownership of and be proud of, to feel like they can accomplish anything."

While Peloquin has danced from an early age and tried her hand at ceramics in college, she doesn't consider herself an artist today, but she is still creative and has therefore incorporated her art skills in the decorating of her classroom. When teachers are starting out, their classrooms are bare. Peloquin wanted hers to be inviting, interesting and engaging, to inspire students to do their best in a clean, creative, comfortable space.

"She's obsessive-compulsive with detail," says her mother, Kris Allard, also a Putnam Elementary School teacher.

Working alongside her mother has been wonderful, says Peloquin, who watched her mom carefully when growing and playing school in the basement, which involved "bossing Brooke around." (Brooke Peloquin, who now works in the robotics field, placed twice in the VFW's Patriot's Pen competition and won second place in the VFW's Voice of Democracy competition.)

Peloquin's students are currently doing a lesson on maps (geography and reading maps) and they will do a unit on

the states later in the year.

She will assign each student a state to cover, which they will research, do a project on and present to their peers. "They become an expert on their own state and then they share with each other." The inspiration for this came, in part, from her own elementary education, especially "the student-led part." When she was about their age, one of her favorite projects was on the Oregon Trail – "We made little journals like we were going west!" – and for a grade five presentation, everyone was assigned a different historical figure to research and bring to life. "I dressed up as Martha Washington," says Peloquin, who notes that her students say the Pledge of Allegiance every morning.

Peloquin looks forward to seeing what her students come up with for their Illustrating America entries, which will be collected by Auxiliary 1523 Secretary-Treasurer Lisa Salisbury. Will one of her students follow in her footsteps and win this year? Time will tell!
